Hunter Mountain Skiing

On Friday, February 12th, the scouts will be heading out to New York to go skiing, snowboarding, or tubing Mountain. Hunter Hunter Mountain has 58 trails totaling 240 acres of skiable area spread out over 2 mountains. Hunter One and Hunter West. longest of these trails is almost two miles long. Studies show that 30% of the trails are beginner, 27% intermediate, 30% difficult, and 13% expert. It also has two terrain parks and a tubing The summit of Hunter West is 3,200 ft., with a 1,600 ft. vertical drop to the base. Which trails will you be going on?

Hunter Mountain is known for its massive snowmaking operation. In 1967



it was the first ski resort to have snowmaking coverage from the top to the bottom of the mountain. In 1980, it was the first ski resort to have snowmaking coverage for the entire mountain. Today, it has a large arsenal of snow making and grooming machines, as well as patents for machine that improve the quality of the snow.

There is a Japanese ski resort called Hunter Mountain Shiobara, which was named after Hunter Mountain and is situated near Tokyo.

For the trip to Hunter Mountain, the scouts will be staying at Tri-Mount Scout Reservation. Tri-Mount is the camp of Rip Van Winkle Council, located in East Jewett, NY. I'm told by Mr. G that the breakfasts and dinner will be at the cabins, and lunch will be on the slopes. I've also heard, and I could be wrong, but there might be dessert so make sure you're looking out for that. Directions to Tri-Mount are below.

- Take the New York State Thruway to Exit 20 at Saugerties
- Follow Route 32 North until intersection of Route 32A
- Bear left onto Route 32A and follow until the Palenville traffic light
- Bear left onto Route 23A and follow until the Tannersville traffic light
- Turn right onto Hill St. Route 23C and follow for 4 miles
- Continue to the left beyond the old stone church at Onteora Park and go down the hill into East Jewett
- Boy Scout Rd is the second right after the bridge in East Jewett
- Follow Boy Scout Rd. to the Camp Tri-Mount Parking Lot

Merit Badges

As many of you may know, the SEMEOS District Merit Badge Fair is the 20th and 21st of February. Merit badges are something all Boy Scouts have to do, but most of the time we as a troop do not really do them together because of the tedious amount of paperwork that goes along with most merit badges out there. Of course, no one should really be deterred by this, but it often a very large factor when doing merit badges. Something you should consider when doing merit badges is whether or not the badge interests you. Unfortunately, you have to do 12 Eagle required merit badges if you want to go for Eagle, so you're stuck doing those. However, for the other merit badges you need, try to pick one that interests you rather than choosing one just because it is there. You'll have more fun if you take something that interests you. Also, don't choose something that you cannot do yet. First year scouts should do easier merit badges to get the feel of how to do a merit badge before jumping into the Eagle required ones. If you want, work together with someone, or better yet, ask your Patrol Leader if your patrol can work on one at a Patrol meeting. While we usually get merit badges in merit badge fairs and summer camp, you can also contact a counselor and meet with them one-on-one (if the merit badge you are working on has a counselor). If you opt to take this choice, then try to complete the merit badge entirely. Have all of the requirements ready and make sure you know your stuff, since you are taking up their time. You also need a parent present if you want to talk to a counselor outside of a fair/summer camp. You can also get the requirements for any merit badge at meritbadge.org. Hopefully with this knowledge you will be able to complete any merit badges.

Applesauce Cake

1 2/3 Cup Flour Don't sift

1 1/3 Cup Sugar

1 TSP Baking Soda

1/4 TSP Baking Powder

3/4 TSP Salt

1/2 TSP Cinnamon

¹/₄ TSP Allspice (I don't use this in my cake)

1/3 Cup Shortening

1/3 Cup Water

2/3 Cup Raisins

1 Cup Applesauce

1 Egg

Confectioner's Sugar

Mix ingredients together. Grease then flour the pan. Oven temp is 350 for 35 minutes Let cool, sprinkle with the Confectioner's sugar
