Household Emegency Kit

From the Boy Scouts of America Emergency Preparedness Kit

What you have on hand when a disaster happens could make a big difference. Plan to store enough supplies for everyone in your household for at least three days.

_____ Water. Have at least one gallon per person per day.

Food. Pack non-perishable, high-protein items, including energy bars, ready-to-eat soup, peanut butter, etc. Select foods that require no refrigeration, preparation or cooking, and little or no water.

_____ Flashlight. Include extra batteries.

_____ First Aid Kit Include a reference guide.

_____ Medications. Don't forget both prescription and non-prescription items.

_____ Battery-operated Weather radio. Include extra batteries.

_____ Tools. Gather a wrench to turn off gas if necessary, a manual can opener, screwdriver, hammer, pliers, knife, duct

tape, plastic sheeting, and garbage bags and ties.

_____ Clothing. Provide a change of clothes for everyone, including sturdy shoes and gloves.

____ Personal Items. Remember eyeglasses or contact lenses and solution; copies of important papers, including

identification cards, insurance policies, birth certificates, passports, etc.; and comfort items such as toys and books.

_____ Hygiene & Sanitary Items. Small bag with toothbrush, toothpaste, soap, comb, facial tissues, towelettes, needle,

thread, shoelaces, toilet paper, bleach

Money. Have cash. (ATMs and credit cards won't work if the power is out.)

____ Contact information. Include a current list of family phone numbers and e-mail addresses, including

someone out of the area who may be easier to reach by e-mail if local phone lines are overloaded.

_____ Pet supplies. Include food, water, leash, litter box or plastic bags, tags, medications, and vaccination information.

Map and Compass. Consider marking an evacuation route on it from your local area.

Other items from the Emergency Preparedness Pamphlet (Book)

- _____ Sleeping bag. (or bedroll of two wool blankets) and waterproof ground cloth
- _____ Poncho or raincoat. (with hood, hat, or sou'wester)
- _____ Matches. or other fire starting tools
- ____ Work gloves
- _____ 50 feet cord. No. 5 sash cord or similar-sized nylon cord
- ____ Hard hat.
- _____ Other equipment. as determined by weather (winter jacket, rubber boots, gloves, etc)
- ____ Pencil and small notebook.
- _____ Watch. (unless you usually wear one)
