Scout Master's Minute-and-a-half

On February 15 and 16 Nativity hosted a training class from the American Heart Association. So your Scoutmaster is now trained in lifesaver first aid with CPR and AED. For those of you that do not know AED stands for automatic external defibrilator. The AED delivers a charge to a person who's heart is no longer in regular rythym. The AED performs an analysis of the patient and tells the rescuer to either apply the shock or begin manual CPR. The church is exploring the purchase of an AED.

As your Scoutmaster I am one of several adult leaders charged with the well being of the members of the Troop. To this end I am also trained in Youth Protection, Hazardous Weather, Safe Swim and Safety Afloat. First Aid is an important part of Scouting. Over the years I've attended to several Scouts from our Troop and others that sustained injuries. I also had to attend to a civilian injured in a motor vehicle accident we came upon on one of our trips. We will be exploring the topic of first aid during the month of April. By the end of April I expect that all Scouts will have covered the topic and met all requirements set forth in the Scout Handbook.
