PROSPEROUS SONORA

The Present Condition of Mining and Milling Interests in Sonora Along the Line of the Sonora Railway
To the Editor of the Star.
Hermosillo, May 16.—Commencing on the northern boundary, the first workings are about two and one-half miles south and west of Nogales. This is an old Spanish mine and the remains of several craters are still to be found, within about one-half mile of the mine. The old workings are being cleaned up and the average of the ore taken out carries 7 ounces silver and 22 per cent of copper to the ton. The property has been leased by a company, and the majority of the stock is held by the United States customs officials at Nogales.
The next point of interest in Agrá Yarcos, where there are some copper prospect holes that promise well. Near Imita, forty-two miles south of the line, there has been considerable work done on a copper claim. The owners, Messrs. Lanz & Bernard, of Magdalena, claim it carries 30 per cent copper and 15 ounces of silver, and that they have a large amount of ore in sight.
Coming south for the next forty miles, there has been very little done, except in the way of prospecting, but there are some good specimens of ore, bearing gold, silver, copper and lead.
Llano Station has been shipping some very fine gold quartz, that was mined within a few miles of there. His property is held principally by San Francisco parties.
Don Manuel Escalante is also opening up what promises to be a very rich lode of gold and silver.
Twelve miles east of Querobabi there is a group of five or six mines that have been opened by Manager Aliz for a Milwaukee company. They have a large amount of low grade ore in sight. The manager is understood to be after a stamp-mill as they have ore enough in sight to justify doing so. Half way between the Aliz mine and the railroad there has been a recent discovery of heavy iron ore, carrying from twenty-five to two hundred ounces to the ton in silver. This property is held by a few of the railroad employees, and they will develop it at once.
East of Querobabi the San Augustine Mining company—Raynolds, manager—is putting out about \$30,000 per month in silver bullion, and will double their milling capacity this month.
The next thirty or forty miles south float bearing silver and copper, but the prospectors have not been able to locate where they come from.
East of Querobabi station, Manager Vorony, of the San Juan de Dios Mining company, claims he has a bonanza, and from specimens he has brought in and his assays, there is no question in regard to it. They commenced shipping ore to Tucson this month.
About twenty miles east of the Yarcos property a company have opened an old Spanish mine and have a large amount of ore in sight, twenty per cent copper and sixteen ounces in gold and silver to the ton. I was not able to visit this property, but from the description given, by an expert it promises to be one of the largest mines to Sonora.
Hermosillo at present seems to be in the center of what will soon be the largest producing district in the state. Fifteen miles to the east are the Joren, Pastor, Tepetates and Romaditas. The first two have at least 50,000 tons of ore in sight that will average \$25 to the ton in silver.
South and east of Hermosillo is the Monte Grande, an old Spanish mine, recently bonded by a local company. It is below Hermosillo. They have a little gold ore on the dump and is the refuse of their old workings. They have at least 10,000 tons of ore in sight that carries 10 ounces in silver and 15 per cent iron. They have shipped considerable quantities of ore on shipments.
Near this point, a prospecting party is putting up a small mill and will be able to place 200 tons of ore in the mill in a few days.

Police No. 47

Section 1. The permanent Police Force of the City of Tucson shall consist of a Chief of Police, a Sergeant, and such number of Police as the Common Council may from time to time determine.
Section 2. The office of the Chief of Police shall be in the City Hall, which shall also be the office for the Police Department and the Police Station.
Section 3. The Chief of Police shall have the honor of the rank of Major and shall be entitled to all the emoluments and distinctions of such rank, and shall be entitled to the same as the Chief of Police of the City of Tucson.
Section 4. The Chief of Police shall be elected by the Common Council, and shall hold office for a term of two years, and shall be eligible for re-election.
Section 5. The Chief of Police shall be the head of the Police Department, and shall be responsible to the Common Council for the conduct of the same.
Section 6. The Chief of Police shall have the honor of the rank of Major and shall be entitled to all the emoluments and distinctions of such rank, and shall be entitled to the same as the Chief of Police of the City of Tucson.
Section 7. The Chief of Police shall be the head of the Police Department, and shall be responsible to the Common Council for the conduct of the same.
Section 8. The Chief of Police shall have the honor of the rank of Major and shall be entitled to all the emoluments and distinctions of such rank, and shall be entitled to the same as the Chief of Police of the City of Tucson.
Section 9. The Chief of Police shall be the head of the Police Department, and shall be responsible to the Common Council for the conduct of the same.
