MAN SHOT ON THE ROAD OVER THE RANGE.

Flight of the Murderer.

On Sunday last, a ranch kept by a man named Faraday, about one mile north of the Summit House, on the top of the pass, was the scene of a cold blooded murder. From the scanty information we can gain, to-day, it appears that a man named Sam Perry, a resident of the San Luis valley, who has for some time past been freighting between this city and Del Norte, was coming towards Pueblo with two teams. He was riding on horseback, and his teams were a considerable distance ahead of him. When he arrived at Faraday's ranch, he stopped, and it is supposed drank some liquor, being slightly intoxicated when he arrived there. Either the men had some quarrel previous to the shooting, or Perry was murdered for the money he had with him. There were no witnesses to the deed except a boy who was at the ranch.

After the shooting Faraday immediately fled, on foot, leaving the body of the murdered man, lying on the road with two bullet holes, one in the head and the other in the body. The body remained where it fell until some passers by picked it up. Mr. Stearns of the Summit House, together with other persons immediately pursued the murderer, and we hope ere this writing he has been captured. Perry leaves a wife and four children in the San Luis Valley.

The place where the murder took place is known as the Jew's rancho.
