As an example of the problem which confronted them, here is a news it in the papers of April 14, 1874:

"A man named Sam Perry, from San Luis Valley, was murdered on Sunday at a place known as the Jew's Rancho, one mile north of the Summit House, the Sangre de Christo Pass, by the proprietor of the place. It is not know whether the murder was committed for money, or in a quarrel."

The PUEBLO CHIEFTON of April 14, 1874, gave further details on the proprietor, "Faraber, the Jew", and concluded:

"Faraber was considered a dangerous man by those who knew him and his house has a bad reputation. He has been known to draw his pistol upon several persons on very slight provacation, and, we fear, if he is capture the district court won't have the trouble of trying him."

The Denver Lodge, finding that Faraber protested his innocence felt i "should take steps to secure for our unfortunate co-religionist a fair and impartial trial and to employ good and able counsel for him....not in the least to shield anybody from justice, but the wise benefits which the law accedes to every prisoner should also be shared by Faraber." The cost of the defense was paid by the Lodge; later, Faraber was sentenced to the penitentiary for five years.

you refer to "Faraber, the Jew" I have been working on the story of Faraber's life for about 10 years now, and finding this reference was like finding a golden nugget for me.

Could you send me Xerox copies of - Any data you might have on him, including the newspaper references you mention, of April 14, 1874, Pueblo Chieften. To the best of my knowledge taraber was sentenced to prison befor for seven years, however escaped to Mexico before actually being put into prison. About Jan 1895 he was given a full parcon by Gov. Waite and was allowed to return to the United States. Do you have any information on the above two paragraphs. If not, could you refer me to a Denver researcher, a graduate student perhaps, that could find references in the newspapers or stete records for me.
